

3 Questions to Finetune Your Teaching

1. What problems are you trying to resolve with strategies that consistently haven't worked? Understanding what's really going on can help you come up with more effective solutions. Consider the possibility there are underlying factors that you've overlooked.

2. Why are you holding on to strategies that consistently haven't worked? Sometimes music teachers cling to past methods because they've invested time and effort into them. Consider the potential benefits of letting go of outdated approaches.

3. How does your vision of music teaching keep you from trying new things? A longstanding vision of music teaching can

create barriers to strategies and tools that resonate better with your students. Sometimes, well-established plans can prevent you from fine tuning and exploring alternatives that address the unique interests of your students.


Food for Thought
