# Why Students Don't Practice

Here are three themes that focus on how music teachers can shape our teaching, so that practicing fits in with what students want to do.


- #1. With beginner students, avoid starting with reading-based method books. Instead incorporate Ear Before Eye strategies and explore the music that's inside students' ears.
- #2. Remember that a steady diet of method books repertoire may not be satisfying for all students. Instead, be prepared to skip pieces and change things up with students' own choice.
- #3. Don't be surprised when teen students indicate they're not interested in learning harder repertoire or moving to the next level.

  Instead help them to explore their musical interests with their current

skillset.

Note to self - Music teachers can't change how our students feel, but we can change what WE do to make things possible.

# Ear Before Eye

Did you know that prominent educators and musicians throughout history have consistently advocated for learning to play by ear as the first step in music learning? According to Swiss educator Pestalozzi (1746-1827), educational processes should always proceed from "known to the unknown" and that direct experience is the basis of all education. Here are a few benefits of Ear Before Eye music learning:

- 1. Students explore their own experiences of pitch, beat, and rhythm without having to decipher written information on a page.
- 2. Students make fewer mistakes because they can hear when things don't sound right.
- 3. Students often feel more comfortable with memorization processes

because their musical understanding is grounded internally. They play from what's inside.
